
HIGH POINT HIGHLIGHTS - AN INSIDE LOOK

STUDENT RECOGNITION:

- Thirty-seven Creative Writing, thirty-three Art, five Dance, and six Video students attended the Teen Arts Festival on Tuesday, March 18.
- **Keith Walton**, a current junior, received a perfect score (800) on the Verbal SAT 1 test in December.
- **Meghan Radimer** has signed a National Letter of Intent to play women's soccer at Houghton College. Meghan is a three-time all-state goalkeeper selection by the New Jersey Girls Soccer Coaches Association and was a three-time All-West Jersey pick. She also earned First-Team all-league and First-Team All-New Jersey Herald honors on three occasions.
- On Friday, February 28, 37 High Point students competed against the rest of the state for leadership roles for the overall NJ Model Congress. The following students were chosen as Committee Chairs: **ES, NR, Curtis Raye, KC** and **Sarah Kuzmiak**. **DU** was chosen as Party Leader; **Scott Shelton** was chosen as Party Whip and **Alexandra Kleinkopf** was chosen as *Overall Chair of the NJ Model Congress*.
- The following students placed at the DECA State Conference: **Jessica Solley, Kim Salokas**, and **Rich Lines** placed 1st overall with their presentation of High Point's Learn and Earn project; **Dan Jenkins** and **TB** placed 1st overall in Business & Financial Services Marketing Research; **MM** placed 1st overall in Apparel and Accessories Marketing Associate Level; **NL** and **Katie Struble** placed 2nd overall in Travel and Tourism Marketing; **KM**, and **Kim Salokas** qualified with their entry in the State Civic Consciousness Project; and **SP** is currently running for Northern Region Vice President and has qualified in Leadership Development Academy.
- Three art students have been selected to exhibit their work in New Jersey's most prestigious competitive high school exhibit called "Fresh Perspectives" at the Morris Museum in Morristown. Five hundred and eighty-four pieces were submitted for consideration. The judges chose pieces for this year's show and we are very proud to announce that **AD, Gavin Gewecke** and **TH** will be part of this year's exhibit. The show, sponsored by the Geraldine Dodge Foundation and the New Jersey State Council, will be held from April 15 through June 15 at the Morris Museum in Morristown.
- Nine students participated in the New Jersey State Science Olympiad on March 18.

- I. Faculty attendance for the month of February was 95.4%
- II. Student attendance for the month of February was 95.6%.
- III. **NR, AM, Stephanie Bockhorn, RW, TS, and Brad Bolte** attended a substance abuse seminar and reported their findings to their health classes.
- IV. Eighty-two students participated in the Peer Counseling Retreat held on February 26 and 27.
